There's a thread running through this book – John was one of a kind. He was welcoming, open, friendly and supportive. He was funny, warm and thought nothing of taking the time to help people out. We are all the richer for having known him.

I'm sure there are many stories we could all tell about John, and his impact on our lives.

It's important for me to say that John was my friend. He gave me a lot of support and advice when I first became CEO, and I learned a huge amount from him. He was incredibly generous with his time – in fact, his days often started late because he spent time telephoning managers across the whole business, making sure they were all happy, and sorting out any issues, before he got down to his own day.

I think it will come as no surprise to say that John had a reputation for being late. He always said it was because he was the second-born twin, and that was certainly a great excuse.

In fact, he was known as 'Any Other Business' because he would always come into meetings late, and then his issues under Any Other Business would take as long as the meeting itself! I always suspected that he deliberately brought complex and difficult issues into that part of the meeting because he knew I had a flight to catch back to London from Glasgow, and it was his best chance of getting a positive decision out of me.

And he was certainly known for getting results. Previously, as director of the Glasgow depot, John was the first branch director to achieve a million pounds of net profit, and that's because he worked incredibly hard, had an immense attention to detail, ran his yard like a production line and was happy to step in to help with anything – including forklift driving when necessary.

It's customary on these occasions to say how wonderful someone was — how kind and how well-liked. In John's case, it's absolutely true. He was genuinely one of the most popular people in the business, always thinking about other people and prepared to do anything for them. I had one quite senior person say to me: "I don't care what I do, I just want to work for John," and I think that says everything about the sort of man he was.

He will be missed by everyone who worked with him, including our clients and suppliers.

John has had such a profound influence on my life, as my boss, my leader, my mentor and, most importantly, as my friend. He has helped me become the person I am today, and I will be forever thankful for his guidance, influence and friendship. I am proud to have known him and will miss him immensely.
